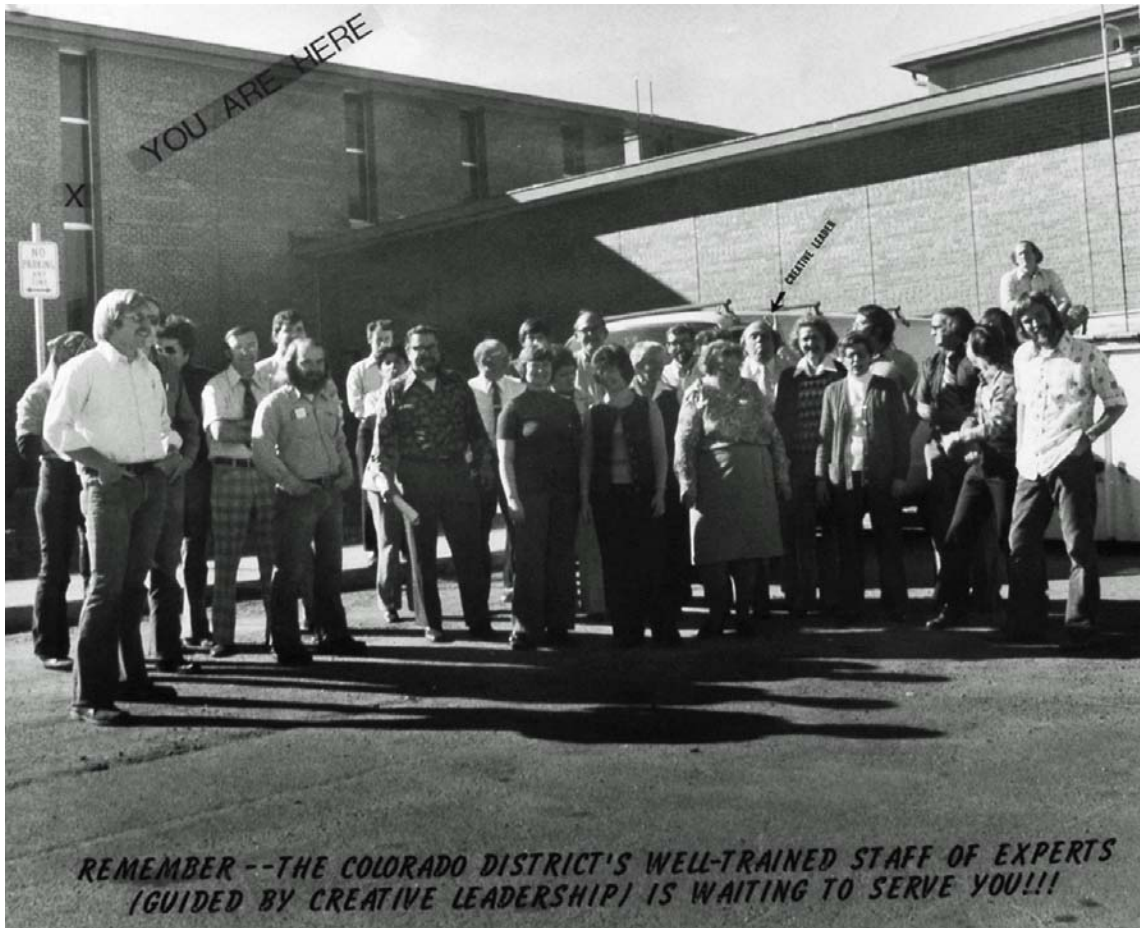
This photograph was taken on the west side of Building 53, not far from the main entrance of the U.S. Geological Survey National Training Center. Like many photos made for and distributed to students, this photo lists the names of 25 employees. The photographer took us outside on a break. You can see the snow! It isn't easy to align the names of the students with the rows. Sometimes images include instructors, sometimes not. About the National Training Center

In the 1960s, the need for a new and better training facility was fostered by an agreement with the U.S. Civil Service Commission in which WRD would provide 6 months of classroom training to new hires as a key factor in a fast-track promotion procedure – an important recruiting pitch. Also, Denver was the site of a training facility previously initiated by A. Ivan Johnson in the Hydrologic Laboratory to train foreign hydrologists. Johnson remained with the NTC until he transferred to the National Headquarters. He was replaced by Delbert W. Brown in December 1970. At that time, the NTC was also significantly remodeled and moved to Building 53.

Thousands of WRD employees have attended classes at the USGS National Training Center (**NTC**). At about the same time that Thad G. McLaughlin became the Regional Hydrologist for the Central Region, many newly hired hydrologists were entering on duty with WRD from universities in the Central Region, and a need for an adequate training facility emerged. The first location of the NTC was in Building 25 where the Regional Hydrologist was also located.
